100 Books for Young Readers in Arabic

This is a selection of 100 books in Arabic for young people published in various countries of the Arab world since 2018. A similar selection made in 2017 is accessible online.

These selections provide an overview of a literature that has experienced real growth over the past thirty years, offering quality works, many of which have won international prizes. Divided by genre and organised in alphabetical order of title, these choices also include some translations into Arabic of books initially published in other languages, with the aim of creating bridges between languages and cultures.

These selections were made by the Arab World reading committee of the French Takam Tikou magazine, which brings together professionals from different backgrounds (BnF, IMA, libraries of the City of Paris).

Note on vocalised text

Several of the books described here have 'vocalised text'. This refers to the various diacritics that are attached to Arabic letters in certain styles of writing. These indicate features such as vowels, consonant doubling and absence of any vowels.

Vocalised text is essential for children learning to read Arabic, as it serves as an indication of how to pronounce words correctly. The use of vocalisation diminishes as children get older and completely master Arabic reading skills. Highlighting that a text is entirely or partially vocalised adds information on the level of difficulty involved.

Abou Karkoubeh, 'Mr Bazaar', can't help hoarding all kinds of things – screwdrivers, bottles, saucepans, papers, keys ... His house is bursting at the seams! To help him, the children of the neighbourhood clear out his house in his absence. But he immediately starts hoarding thousands of things again.

The sadness and loneliness of Abou Karkoubeh are palpable in this touching depiction of a character on the margins of society. The illustrations show the gaudy bric-a-brac through a tangle of lines and colours, with contrasting fully drawn and sketchy shapes.

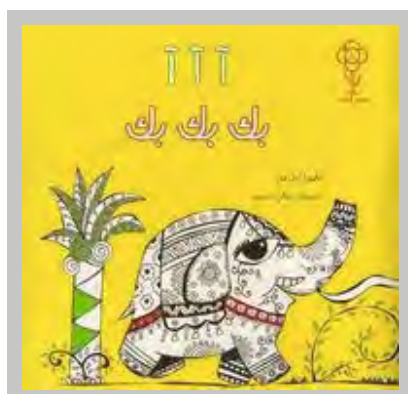
[Adel's colourful birds] عصافير عادل الملونة

Little Adel loves creating paper birds more than anything in the world. Nothing distracts him from his folding, neither the ringing of the telephone, nor the cries of the children playing outside, nor the grandmother's radio, nothing! But when the red lamp placed near his door lights up, Adel interrupts his activity to go to eat. And the reader then realises that Adel is deaf, that he communicates by signs with those around him and that he knows how to lipread ...

The delicate, fine illustrations correspond well to the atmosphere of this work which has found an original and sensitive way to talk about deafness. Adel is a happy, fulfilled child, surrounded by colors, his deafness is presented naturally in the album, without dramatization, without excessive staging. A great success!

This lovely book is at once a picture book, a colouring book and a book that names the sounds animals make. The illustrations are modern and very original, while drawing their graphic references from Egyptian heritage, as well as from the legacy of the great illustrators who were among the pioneers of children's literature in the Arab world.

Indeed, anchoring its books in modern Egyptian culture while providing children with quality work in both content and form is one of the declared objectives of this young publishing house, established in 2014. Its first publications seem to be meeting this challenge.



[Alphabet sounds] أصوات الأبجدية

This ingenious and poetic book highlights the unique and playful nature of the Arabic language. For each letter of the alphabet, there is at least one onomatopoeic sound from nature or everyday life, formed by the repetition of two short syllables: *basbas* (to address a cat), *tharthar* (chatter) and so on for 26 of the 28 letters of the alphabet; only the first (*alif*) and the last (*ya*) escape the rule.

The illustrations are made up of letters and words created from simple geometric shapes: on the right-hand page, the isolated letter is in purple red; on the left-hand page, the onomatopoeia is in fuchsia pink.

This very large-format book is a beautiful object.

Jad and Tala are spending a day at their father's veterinary surgery. What with Mrs Farida's dog, which escapes from his cage and makes Zizi's cat leap with fright, which in turn frightens Mr Said's parrot, which flies around the surgery crying 'Marhaba! Marhaba!' [Hello! Hello!], things are certainly lively at the surgery. Not to mention Jassim, a camel who sticks his head through the door. A pacy text with visual jokes about the size and weight of the characters. Lively, brightly coloured illustrations capture the atmosphere of this crazy day.

Lucas builds a world with bricks, towers and a road... then the fox arrives who likes this world and the idea of living there... but this world would need a forest for his den. So Lucas "builds" a forest. Then it's the turn of the bear, the goose, the shepherd, the dragon, the ogre and the mermaid to all ask Lucas to reshape his world to accommodate their individual needs. Finally, Lucas manages to create the most fabulous of worlds, populated by all the characters he's met!

This active picture book, punctuated by the repetition of each character's wishes, manages to create the freshness of a dream world for children to enjoy.

In this bestiary, the author presents, with great delicacy, his vision of the aquatic animals of the Ganges, which have fascinated him since childhood. Having learned the drawing and painting techniques of the ancient Mithila art, he developed his own painting processes, while using ancestral know-how, such as the use of natural pigments.

Rambharos Jha makes funny and unexpected comments on his paintings, offering a different perspective on the illustrations.

Adam doesn't want to play with his little brother or lend him his toys; he screams and stamps his foot. His mother says 'Here comes the Big Bad Mood on a visit today!' Adam starts looking for this Big Bad Mood under the bed, in the garden, but he finds nothing. Suddenly, a strange creature appears who wants to do the most stupid things, and Adam realises it is his behaviour that is making his friends unhappy – and that's not what he wants. He doesn't want to play with the Big Bad Mood any more.

With a good dose of fun, this picture book plays down anger in order to help young children (and their parents) to learn to cope better with it. This is a book to put you in a good mood!

A black line runs down the middle of each page and every time a new page is folded over we see something different on the next. As these pages move towards a crescendo, we are in the middle of the sky with lots of strange creatures. "Everybody thought it was a black line but we imagined lots of other beautiful things." The picture book concludes with a proposal: "And you, what do you see?"

It is accompanied by the beautifully graphic interplay of changing lines and is attractively original.

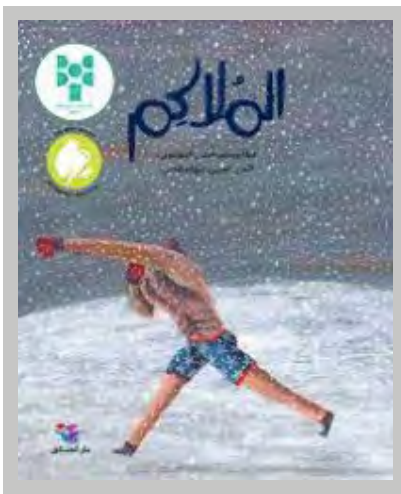


[Bou] بو

Bou and Louna have a very successful day's fishing. They even catch an enormous fish full of things – each one stranger than the next. At nightfall, the friends make for home, dreaming of the next day's fishing.

What makes this picture book so fascinating is the alternative story being told by the illustrations. We get to know Louna, a mischievous little girl, but we also see that her sidekick, Bou, is what we might describe as a monster – if a very nice one! The author-illustrator plays with the colours and textures of the layered paper she uses to create a charming universe full of humour.

This magnificent picture book tells the story of a passionate boxer. His gloves, inherited from his father, are decorated with green hearts, lovingly embroidered by his mother. Having become a hugely popular boxer, the boy discovers solitude, and the green hearts on his gloves begin to fade. Then he remembers that his father used to box to give people pleasure, so he boxes the sea to calm it down so that fishermen can sail their boats; he boxes the mountains to make paths for travellers; and – what do you know! – one day, a little boy asks him, "Will you please teach me how to box?"

The illustrations are real paintings with subtle colours.

This book is about an unusual friendship between a little boy and a dragon called Chouchouya. The boy goes for a walk in the sunshine, sows seeds in the fields, flies on Chouchouya's back to castles and forts. His red pyjamas are transformed, as the situation changes – from the skin of a little dragon to a tiger-trainer's suit; one moment he's in a clown costume, next thing the little boy looks like a hard-working farmer. At the end of the day, he eats his dinner, brushes his teeth and goes to bed to read a story and go to sleep next to Chouchouya – who turns out to be a soft toy.

The typography curves to follow the movements of the characters and blends with the illustration to create this joyful story.



[The colour violet] اللون البنفسجي

Nour and her family have had to leave their country to flee war, and now they have settled in a foreign country. Nour quickly makes friends with a classmate called Clara, but when Clara meets Nour's mum one day, her behaviour changes.

Writing with finesse and subtlety, the author addresses the question of differences in culture and religion. The illustrations simply accompany the text, without revealing anything of the story. Nour's point of view and her perplexity in the face of her friend's many questions are perfectly rendered by the illustrations, and it is only at the very end that the reader has the key to the story.

This little snail is a typical pre-teen: he watches TV most of the night, and the next day he has a hard time getting up. Fortunately, his mother remembers to wake him before she leaves the house. Unfortunately, he takes his time getting ready. Fortunately, since he's still wearing yesterday's clothes, it doesn't take him too long to get dressed. Unfortunately, he just misses the school bus. Fortunately, he knows the way to school. This sequence of 'fortunately/unfortunately' leads to a completely unexpected outcome.

Lots of humour in the text and illustrations, and not the slightest trace of any moralising. This lovely picture book is a delightful read, one to put into the hands of all parents.

When Rooster cries out his 'cock-a-doodle-do', he is surprised to hear a little boy imitate him. This obviously does not please our feathered friend! The ensuing duel promises to be close between the two protagonists. When one flaps his wings, the other moves his arms; when one raises his beak to heaven with a disdainful gesture, the other raises his nose. But when the boy tries, like Rooster, to perch on a rope stretched between two plants, he finds himself on the ground! Then the roles are reversed and it is Rooster who tries to imitate the child...

The division of the pages alternates vignettes, close-ups and wider shots, which enhance the rapid pace of the action. The text is full of humour and can also be seen in the warmly coloured illustrations. A great success!



[A drop plus a drop... make the sea]

A highly poetic vision of the creation of the universe, in Lebanese dialect Arabic, presented like a poem, with frequent line breaks and a layout that reinforces the rhythm and accentuates the poetic, even dreamlike side. Leen Charafeddine uses highly graphic illustrations in blue, yellow, green and white, which provide an interesting counterpoint to the poetry of the text. A great success!

A little duck is travelling with other migratory ducks. They stop for a few moments to rest on a lake, and our little duck falls asleep. When she wakes up, she is trapped in the ice. A little black bird passes by and asks, 'How did you manage to get yourself stuck in the ice? Well, I'll try to help.' But it doesn't work. Several animals try to free the duck, but they can only do so when they combine forces.

A lovely picture book, whose vocalised text is punctuated by repeated phrases that work like a refrain. The illustrations, made up of large areas of bright colours, give us towering vertical perspectives from time to time.

An absent-minded artist called Fahim wears trousers that are too short one day. People view him with suspicion at first, but then they start to copy him. Soon the whole city is wearing trousers that are too short! It's the same when Fahim wears clothes that are stained with bleach, full of holes, un-ironed – and when he wears two shoes of different colours. Without realising it, Fahim becomes a fashion designer. Boutiques, accessories – his name is everywhere!

The text, which makes fun of fashionistas, is short, rhymed and funny; but what is most striking here are the illustrations in beautiful, shimmering colours, which create a universe full of fantasy and charm.



[The feast] العيد

The narrator tells us about her first memories of the Muslim festival of Eid. She hears her mother say, 'Eid is coming', she gets a new dress and her mother bakes cakes. On the morning of the party, the ritual of visits begins: the neighbours bring pastries, the whole family goes to visit the grandparents. The little girl, who thinks that Eid is a person, is puzzled: where is this famous 'Eid'? Every year, Eid comes again. But the day that war breaks out nearby, people flee. Those who stay in the village will not be celebrating Eid this year.

The text and the delicate, poetic and luminous illustrations capture the warm atmosphere of the celebration, until the last pages of the book, where we see the sad loss of happiness.

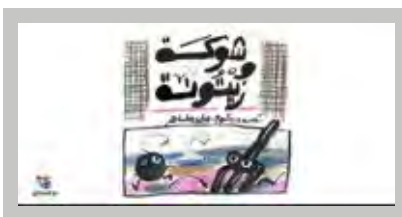


[For your birthday] في عيد ميلادك

On your birthday, you can: "Party with the family or simply sleep all day", "invite friends to the house or stay alone and silent", "eat sweets and drink juice or eat aubergine and rice"... The important thing is not in these details, but in the very meaning of this moment when we become a year older, surrounded by the people we love. This is what Samy tells us, a little boy full of life and very mischievous, always smiling no matter the situation, and whose good humour is contagious.

The drawings do not simply illustrate the text, but extend and enrich it through humorous details.

Pursued by a fork, Zaytouna ('olive' in Arabic) manages to jump off the plate just in time! Then a chase starts, which takes the olive and the fork through the streets of the city to the port, on board a huge ship, then onto a tiny boat, and then to an island on which there stands – miraculously! – a magnificent olive tree, and at its foot is a multitude of olives. The tables are turned: Zaytouna and her companions set out in pursuit of the fork, which finds refuge – in a shop selling kitchen utensils!

The author-illustrator brings humour, poetry – and politics – to this short, accessible picture book.

A little girl is telling us about her everyday life, sometimes at Mum's house, sometimes Dad's. With Mum, she goes to swimming lessons and reads stories. With Dad, she rides her bicycle and watches movies. Every evening, she rings the parent she is not with to say 'Good night'. Our heroine has a good life and copes very well with her parents' separation.

The lively illustrations anchor the story in the UAE, both through the settings and the characters' clothing, and render well the love that unites the parents and the little girl. An all-round success – one to be shared.

The sisters Hana and Chifa are hens – and cooks. They manage a very popular restaurant. Each has her own view about food: Hana likes everything spicy, oily and sweet; Chifa favours healthy food that is neither oily nor sweet nor spicy. Suffice to say that the two sisters don't always agree. One day, after an argument, each of them decides to open her own restaurant. But neither the super-healthy cuisine of Chifa nor the super-rich food offered by Hana finds favour with the crowds. What if they go back to cooking together and combining their knowledge?

Aly Elziny's lively and mischievous illustrations are absolutely delicious. A little gem of a book, well worth tasting!

Nabil's mum tells him she has a surprise and shows an album containing ultrasound scans, a photo of her in front of the cradle prepared for Nabil six months into the pregnancy, then photos of him at birth and at different stages of his growth. Then, the mother opens a second album containing an ultrasound image showing a tiny embryo. Nabil realises that his mother is expecting another child and runs to tell his father the news...

The originality of this book is to be applauded, as it uses ultrasound images to explain to the child the period leading up to birth and to prepare him or her for the arrival of a brother or sister.

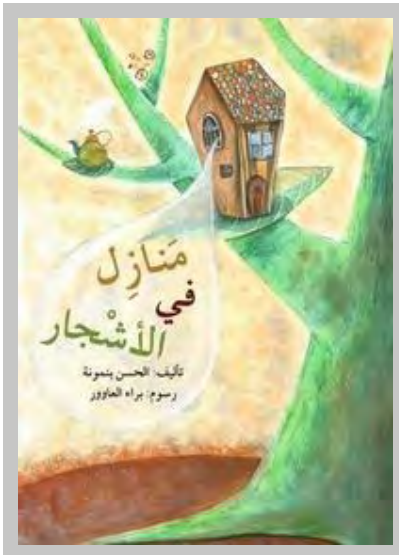


[Here's your glasses, Abla] هذه عدساتك يا عبلة

Seven-year-old Abla lives at the top of a building with a view of the old part of the city. The day she wears her first glasses, she sees beyond the terrace rubbish and collapsed walls, where she had imagined palaces and golden domes. How disappointing! To console herself, she'll need to take a walk with her family around the old town.

A sensitive story, partially vocalised, with charming illustrations.

A boy plants a willow tree in a little garden. What if it grew and grew, if its roots pushed up out of the ground and lifted up a house? What if, little by little, all the buildings were raised up from the ground? We would have a city suspended in the air! And we could sleep in a house that would rock gently. But we would need special ladders to climb up.

The text takes the reader into this suspended city and the humorous illustrations live up to the imaginary universe they depict.

Qurunfula is a zebra. Her white dress is striped elegantly with black. One spring day, as she is returning home, she sees some very beautiful flowers, which have a powerful scent. As she approaches, she starts sneezing so hard that she loses all the stripes off her pretty dress! What a catastrophe – no one will recognise her anymore! Qurunfula tries everything to solve her problem, from rolling in the mud to sticking paper on her dress in place of the lost stripes. Alas, nothing works. But to her friends, even without her dark stripes, Qurunfula is still Qurunfula.

The illustrations use pencil, pastels and collages in very successful compositions, and the relief effect of the collages is well rendered by the high-quality printing. A beautiful book, full of humour and sweetness.

The chadda (حِذَّاء) is a sign that is placed over a consonant in Arabic script to indicate that it must be doubled. In this beautiful rhythmic picture book, the chadda explains, through examples, that it is placed above the letters to make them stronger, like 'super-letters'. This gives all the letters of the alphabet ideas – they all want to wear a chadda.

The bright and lively illustrations, full of humour, succeed in making images of text. The words sometimes take the form of the animals they designate, and the scene where the letters all insist they want to wear the chadda will evoke smiles. A successful and original picture book.

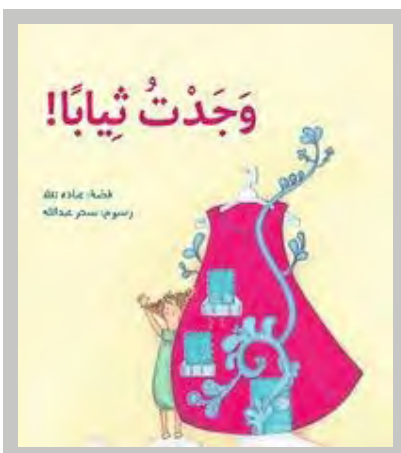


[I dream of being a cement mixer!] أحلم أن أكون خالط إسمنت!

Little Haddam ('destroyer' in Arabic) is a demolition machine with a wrecking ball. He has a dream: he wants to be a cement mixer. But how can you build anything when you are a demolition machine? We can tell him that demolition is necessary so that we can then start to build, but that doesn't work. And as the wrecking ball moves according to his emotions, Haddam demolishes in spite of himself.

The humorous illustrations give a kind of humanity to the machines. The book's production is particularly nicely done: the grey cardboard used on the cover and the background of the illustrations looks like raw cement. A beautiful achievement!

Mariam's 'new' dress used to belong to a neighbour who had given it away. Leyla thinks this is a brilliant idea. She tells her mother about it, and they also set up a table at the entrance to their building. And the neighbourhood children recognise each other's clothes.

The text is entirely vocalised and in an easily accessible spelling. The very nice illustrations, which combine several techniques, capture the textures of the dresses and the warm atmosphere that prevails in this neighbourhood.

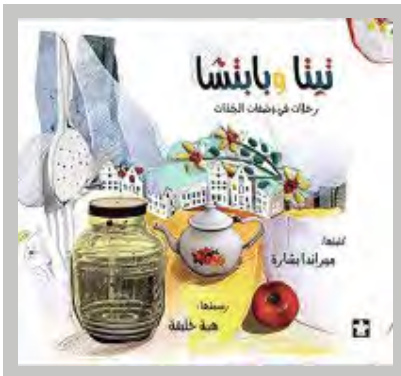

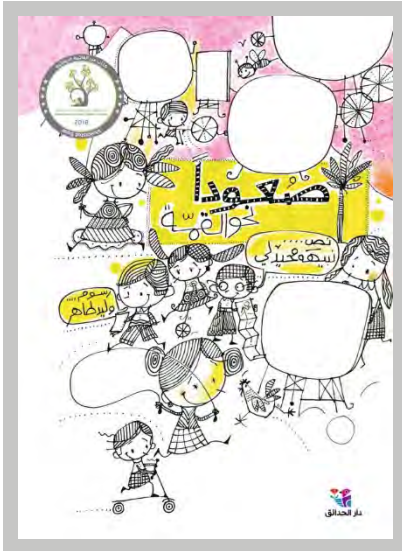

The whole thing is innovative, appealing and original.

One day, Anya falls into a pit and finds herself face to face with the ghost of a little girl, and this episode changes her outlook on life. With its accurate depiction of the stresses and strains of a difficult time of life, this story is sure to engage young readers, who will easily identify with the protagonist.

The translation renders the dialogue very realistically, even in literary Arabic.

Memories of tastes, smells, games, friends, school, and childish pranks are mixed with the tragic history of the country – massacres of Palestinians, civil war, and injustices. This insider account makes the political and historical realities tangible.

The translator offers a very pleasant and fluid text. A must-read comic book!

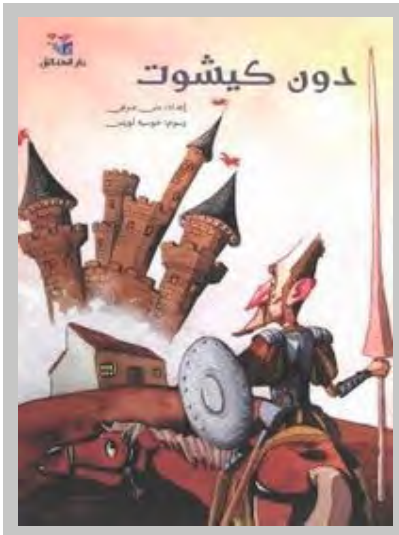

In 2011, Jérôme Tubiana, a journalist and researcher, met Mohammed Al-Gorani, a Saudi of Chadian origin, who had the dubious privilege of being the youngest detainee in the famous Guantanamo Bay, before eventually being exonerated. His interviews with Al-Gorani are the basis for this precisely documented comic book. From his arrest in Pakistan in the aftermath of the September 11 attacks, when he was just a student, to his release six years later, the terrible life Al-Gorani lived through is recounted in detail.

The refined – one might almost say well-behaved – black-and-white drawings eschew overstatement or voyeurism.

And when Rami, her cousin's best friend, gives her a black-and-white portrait of her that he has drawn, the sky clears.

This pocket-sized comic book faithfully captures teenage sensitivities. In the children's literature of the Arab world, it is unusual to find books that so accurately evoke this period of emotional fragility.



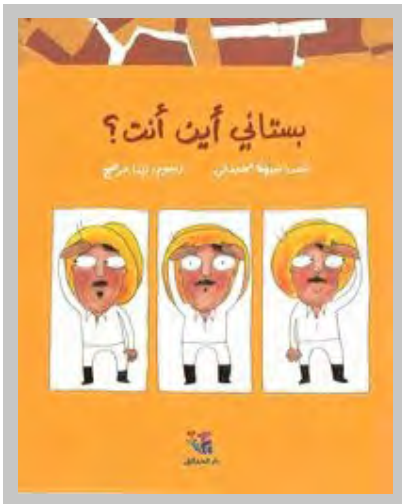

In these dramatic circumstances, Mandela made an unprecedented and unimaginable gesture: he met the general and succeeded in convincing him to lay down his arms. This proved to be a decisive moment in South Africa's history, which prevented bloodshed.

The text is not vocalised, but the speech bubbles are not overloaded with text and the dialogue is easy to read. A comic book for young and old.

Lena Merhej uses a mixture of cut-outs and drawings to render, with much humour, the emotions of this gardener whose certainties have been shaken. The text plays with repetitions to create a catchy reading rhythm. The whole forms an original, sympathetic work – and is one of the few comic strips in Arabic aimed at children.

Just as Scheherazade was able to prevent her husband from killing her by telling him a story every night without ever finishing it, Baptiste, through his moving presence and his amusing stories, manages to give this lady obsessed with death a reason to live while she is waiting for her son to visit.

The illustrations give us a certain distance from the harsh reality of medical emergencies. Being an emergency intern, doctor or nurse is not just a professional vocation, but a social and humanitarian commitment.

These five large format, brightly coloured volumes invite the reader to explore the Arabic language playfully in an interactive way. Each book includes a story and games based around a letter whose sound is similar in Arabic, for example: the letter (س) sin which is pronounced [s] and the letter (ص) sad which is pronounced [s]. The concept is ambitious; rather than using dialect, the stories are written in Lebanese Arabic, which is often chosen as the gateway for learning Arabic. By speaking to Lebanese children in their mother tongue, and using both the written and spoken language in these books, this is a great way to explore the infinite possibilities of this magnificent language, which is often perceived to be difficult to learn how to write.

Born in 1432 in the region of Julphar (today the UAE), Ibn Majid, followed in his father and grandfather's footsteps to become a ship's captain. Benefitting from a literary and scientific education, he became a learned scholar, and is considered to be the inventor of marine sciences. This science, which includes the study of various disciplines (astronomy, geography, understanding of the winds and season, of latitude and longitude...) allowed him to develop highly complex rules for navigation in the Indian Ocean. His work was later used by Europeans in their search for a sea route to Asia.

Ibn Majid was also a poet and some of his work is included in the book He died in 1500.

This book, with a partially vocalised text, reflects the richness and variety of his studies and is a high quality introduction for young readers to the life and work of this great man.
